# SPIRIT OF MVHS LIVES IN MEMBER OF CLASS OF '29

Myrtle Westcott Licht sums it up simply. "I always said I gotta live to be old so I don't miss anything."

Her longevity was applauded Saturday morning, as hundreds of Mount Vernon High School alumni and community members gathered for the all-school reunion breakfast at the high school for Heritage Days. Myrtle was recognized as the oldest known living alumnus of MVHS. She's 98 years old and graduated with a class of 29 in 1929.

"I'm opting to be 110," Myrtle said, adding that she's in good enough shape she could have run the Heritage Days 5K before the breakfast.

Myrtle spent most of her life after MVHS in Cedar Rapids. Today, she lives at the Clarence Nursing Home. This is the first time she's been able to come to Mount Vernon for Heritage Days alumni events.

"This sure doesn't look like Mount Vernon," she said, sitting in what she called and "extraordinary" new high school.

When she was in school, she attended the then new high school – what's now the First Street Building and often called the "old middle school." "It was brand new," Myrtle recalls.

An only child, she lived across the street with her parents and grandparents. Both of her parents worked – her mom was a milliner, her dad owned theaters – so her grandma often got Myrtle ready for school. She recalled how her grandmother "had it down to the second" when getting Myrtle up for school and making sure she was ready in time to head out the door.

At their home by the high school, a boy two years her senior lived two places down. "He was tall and, boy, could he whistle," Myrtle recalled. She made certain she was on the porch when he left the house.

She and the boy – Joseph Sedlacek – married. They were married 39 years until his death. She later married Martin Licht. Myrtle had no children and has no relatives around.

After graduating from MVHS, Myrtle went to business college in Cedar Rapids, commuting back and forth via the interurban. When she was 65, she retired from a radiation center in Cedar Rapids.

She said MVHS prepared her for life after school. "When I was there, the Mount Vernon school was ranked 21st in the United States," she said. "It was a great school – you knew everybody, you knew all your teachers."

At the all-alumni event, Myrtle was presented with a plaque. "The spirit lives on in you," it reads. "This is nice ... very nice," Myrtle said.

# EXCEPTIONAL ALUMNI HONORED AT MVHS HOMECOMING

### Dick Bowman, Class of '58 Alumni Achievement

Dick Bowman of Shore-wood, Minn., is recognized as one of the finest trial lawyers in the nation. He was nominated for the Alumni Achievement award by his brother, Robert Bowman'58.

"Being from Mount Vernon and having attended school there has always been a huge part of who I am," he said in a letter accepting the award.

After graduating from MVHS in 1958, he went on to Cornell College, where he graduated in 1968 magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. He went on to attend the University of Minnesota Law School.

After graduating in 1965, cum laude, he joined the Gray Plant law firm in Minneapolis, where he soon became a partner. He practiced there until starting the Bowman and Brooke law firm on Feb. 1, 1985. Starting with offices in Minneapolis and Phoenix, the firm has since added offices in Los Angeles and San Jose, Calif., Detroit, Mich., and Richmond, Va. Bowman has been managing partner of the firm for all 24 years, until he stepped down in January.

Bowman cited "two unparalleled opportunities" at MVHS: academics and extracurricular activities.

"We had a great faculty, and I learned to study and to excel," he said in his letter. "Whether it was Charlie Krause teaching English, dramatic arts and declamation, or Red Miller teaching science or Leo Gurst teaching math ...

our faculty was top notch. I didn't really understand how top notch until I got into Cornell College and discovered that I could academically compete with anyone there no matter which big city or private high schools they had come from "

Looking back now, Bowman sees a "rich array" of extracurricular activities he could participate in. "Precisely because the high school had limited enrollment (I think my class had 45 members), a student got to do everything if he wanted to," he said. As a result, he played football on the conference champion team in 1957, had roles in dramatic productions, entered declamation competitions, sang in the chorus, and played trumpet in the band.

"The result was that I grew up in high school thinking that it was normal to be on my feet in front of crowds of people, performing either verbally, vocally, instrumentally or athletically," he said. "I am absolutely sure that this early competence and confidence on my feet was the driving force that sent me to law school to become a courtroom trial lawyer."

Bowman's career has involved defending manufacturers against product liability claims. His firm, the largest supplier of defense lawyers to the worldwide auto industry, is the only one that tries cases in all 50 states, and its client list includes: Ford, General Motors, Toyota, Volkswagen, Nissan, Subaru, Chrysler, Hyundai, Kia, Honda, Kawasaki, Yamaha and many others. The firm recently was named the number one product liability defense firm in the nation by The Legal 500, a lawyer rating firm.

"Again, that Mount Vernon High School gave me both sides of the equation I needed to become what happened to

### Paul Hufford, Class of '80 Sports Hall of Fame

Paul Hufford of Shawnee, Kan., was nominated by his family for the award (names). He is regional marketing manager for the Transport America trucking firm.

"Mount Vernon ought to feel fortunate for the teachers and coaches who have stuck around so long," Hufford told the Sun. "There were plenty of outstanding teachers and coaches who helped the transition to college."

Hufford, the son of Ann and the late Harold Hufford, was a standout athlete at Mount Vernon from 1976 through 1980. He lettered in four sports and won state championships in wrestling and track. He recovered from a major knee injury suffered during the wrestling regional finals during his senior year in high school.

He overcame the injury to become a three-year letter winner at the University of lowa and was named defensive lineman of the year his senior year. While at lowa, his brother Mike'79 also was on the football team. Prior to that, brother Joe'75 was a Hawkeye player.

As a member of the MVHS football team, Hufford earned many honors: three-time letter winner (positions played: offensive tackle, nose guard, punter), three time all-conference, two-time first team all-state, member of conference champion team, Adidas All American and was a captain.

As a wrestler, Hufford was a: four-time letter winner at 155 pounds, 167 pounds, 185 pounds and heavyweight; three-time conference champ; three time state participant (first place, fifth place, qualifier); member of third place team and fourth place team; runner-up state freestyle wrestling (heavyweight); and captain.

On the track team, he was: a three-time letter winner (shot put, hurdles), a three-time member of a conference champion-ship team; a two-time conference champ (shot put); a one-time state champ (shot put); a conference placewinner (fourth in high hurdles); and a member of a team that placed fourth in state. He won two letters as a baseball player and was named all conference once.

Hufford's college football accomplishments included: three-time letter winner; two-time All Big Ten; two time All American; Big 10 defensive lineman of the year; and serving as a captain during his senior year. He was a member of the Rose Bowl, Gator Bowl, Peach Bowl and Freedom Bowl teams.



# MOUNT VERNON IS ONE 'COOL TOWN'

Well over half a million people are learning about Mount Vernon, after a national travel magazine dubbed the community one of the "Top 10 coolest small towns in America." Already, it's creating a buzz in the community and elsewhere.

Mount Vernon made the top-10 list in the October edition of Arthur Frommer's Budget Travel magazine. Yanina Erman, a spokesperson for Budget Travel, told the Sun that the list is "the editor's picks" based on an online Budget Travel poll last spring asking people to nominate and vote for the coolest small towns.

"The town certainly had some enthusiasm," she said, referring to the nomination and votes Mount Vernon received online. In the online poll last spring, Budget Travel asked for nominations of towns under 10,000 that are "on the upswing" and places that are "beginning to draw attention – and new residents – because of the quality of life, arts and restaurant scene, or proximity to nature. We want towns with an edge, so think avant-garde galleries, not country stores."

The Coolest Small Towns in America feature in this month's magazine edition is subtitled, "Every now and then, you stumble upon a town that's gotten everything right – great coffee, food with character, shop owners with purpose. These 10 spots have it all, in perfectly small doses."

The story on Mount Vernon, by Thisbe Nissen, says the community is a place where "art isn't confined to gallery walls." The piece reports "In Mount Vernon, about a 20-minute drive east of Cedar Rapids, art isn't confined to gallery walls. As you're driving in on Highway 30, a local artist's rendition of Grant Wood's 'American Gothic,' splashed on the side of a barn, immediately sets the town's tone. And at an annual sidewalk-chalk festival, which takes place each May, hundreds of people put their stamp on more than 4,000 square feet of the main drag."

The "American Gothic" piece was done by Mount Vernon artist and Lisbon School art teacher Mark Benesh'83.

# SUTLIFF BRIDGE -WHAT'S HAPPENING?

Follow this link to an online survey being conducted by Johnson County to determine the fate of the flood-damaged bridge.

The county currently has three options, each using a combination of Federal and tax-payer dollars to affect the missing bridge span which toppled into the river with record 2008 floods. One option involves replacing the lost span with one similar in appearance, another option is replacing the lost span with a cable-stay span, and third option is demolition of remaining spans and use of Federal reimbursements funds for other Johnson County projects.


This survey is being conducted as the result of pleas from local residents to the Johnson County Board of Supervisors. More than 100 people turned out at a recent Johnson County supervisors meeting, some traveling from as far as California, to make a case to save the historic bridge site.

The bridge crosses the Cedar River at Sutliff and was partially destroyed when 2008 flood waters pushed the eastern span into the river. The bridge is eligible for \$1.7 million in restoration funds from FEMA. However, Johnson County could also use \$1.4 million of the FEMA funds on alternate projects in the county.

Many want to see the bridge restored and preserved as it has been the site of parades, picnics, photos, and even marriage proposals. And the Johnson County Supervisors recognize the strong emotions many have about saving the bridge.

"This is shaping up to be one of the toughest issues the board has faced," Johnson County Board of Supervisors Chairman Terrence Neuzil said recently. The County set up the on-line survey to collect public input towards a decision about restoring the bridge. The county expects to make a final decision later this month.

The most valuable item at Mount Vernon's newest antique shop might just be a piece not for sale. Held in a plastic sleeve atop a three-ring binder is a 1909 ledger page from the shoe store that was located in the antique shop's new home. It details the charges and payments of D.L. Boyd. He's the great-grandfather of Kim Wolfe'74, who with her husband Glenn'72 opened Wolfe's Antiques at 121 1st St. N.W. in uptown Mount Vernon in 2008.

Wolfe said Frank Benesh'56 gave her the ledger – his grandfather owned the shoe store where Wolfe's is now set up. She said it's that kind of history – that kind of connection – that makes her and her husband excited about opening a shop on main street. "Glenn and I have always had good feelings here," she said of the location. "It's always had a good vibe for us."

Kim and Glenn have a rich history in this community, with original Mount Vernon settlers. D.L. (David Lindsey) Boyd arrived in the U.S. in 1862. Glenn's great-great-great-grandfather, John Wolfe Sr., arriving in Iowa in 1839; on his mom's









side, the Stonekings came in the mid-1850s. Kim said it's through family that they developed an interest in antiques, including through her grandparents and Glenn's dad, Bob Wolfe'48.

Their love of Mount Vernon, and the history here, led them to open an antique shop in 1989. Since then they have had a furniture stripping and refinishing business in addition to being antique dealers in Middleton, Wis.

Then in 2008 they returned to Mount Vernon, where for two months they extensively remodeled the front space of the building they are now in on Main Street, transforming it from a restaurant to a store.

Wolfe said the focus of items in the store is on "things that can go right into somebody's home." Items are numerous and diverse at Wolfe's Antiques. There's glassware, silver, early china and antique prints. The Wolfes enjoy quilts, and have a few of them for sale. In a back room, artwork by Kim's mother, Ruth Ipsan-Brown, is located. In the future, the Wolfes might take over more of their new space for an art gallery.

### FIRED UP: A decade later and I still love what I do

Editor's Note: In 2008 Crystal Eskelsen celebrated ten years as a reporter for the Mount Vernon-Lisbon Sun. Here is a portion of the article she wrote to tell about those ten years.

It's true what they say – time really does fly when you're having fun!

I can't believe it has been 10 years since I read the help wanted advertisement for a job covering high school basketball games for the Mount Vernon-Lisbon Sun.

We were living in Coralville at the time and had a brand new baby. I was looking for a part-time job to help support our little family as my husband went to graduate school.

I called the newspaper and spoke with Mike Weiler – the sports editor at the time. He asked me to bring in some writing samples when I came for my interview. I scraped together a couple of papers that I had written in my one college English class.

Writing was one thing that I swore I would never do unless I absolutely had to. I didn't like English classes because the scoring was so arbitrary, while my math and statistics problems were clearly right or wrong. I waited until my junior year of college to take my first English class – that's how much'l didn't want to do any writing.

But, I did love sports and the thought of covering high school sports was pretty exciting.

I had ever taken any pictures. I told him that I owned a camera and had taken a high school photography class.I walked out of the newspaper that day with a job (an assignment to cover Mount Vernon basketball) and an ancient 35mm camera in hand. Jeff Schwiebert was the boys' basketball coach and Pat O'Donnell was the head coach for the girls – wow, that seems like a long time ago. At that point, we took all of our pictures on film. I recently read those first articles I wrote and it amazes me how far I've come.

Ten years later, I cover every Lion and Mustang team in one form or another. I celebrate their victories and struggle through their losses right along with them. I love my job, I love getting to know the athletes and the coaches and most of all I love taking the pictures.

The photography part of my job has changed dramatically over the years, as my equipment went from that first clunky 35mm camera to an irritatingly slow early digital camera, to a my current 35mm digital SLR. I take great pride in capturing faces of athletes as they participate in their sports and that has gotten much simpler with the aid of technology.

I would wish for every person to have a job that they love as much as I love mine. Recently, publisher Jake Krob and I were at the Ú.S. Cellular Center for the state volleyball tournament. We saw an older woman wandering the sidelines with a camera in hand and Jake made a comment about that being me in 50 years – if I could only be that lucky!

If that works out to be the case, I will be a truly grateful person. Grateful for the opportunity to be involved in something I love to do.

### ORIGINAL 1890 ALUMNI ASSOCIATION RECORD BOOK DONATED

It's a small, old, tattered book, with it's spine barely holding the pages together. But the treasures inside it are priceless. A record book dating to 1890, holds the first Mount Vernon High School Alumni Association by-laws and charter member names, along with a 1943 Hawkeye-Record newspaper article explaining how it got into their hands.

How it got into our hands? Many thanks to Randy Hoidahl'61, who along with his brother Rich'59, brought it to Mount Vernon this past summer. Randy found it among his deceased mother's belongings, Florence Hoidahl who was a long-time reporter for the *Hawkeye-Record*, and wanted it to come back to the Alumni Association.

Prior to that, Jay Boyd from the class of 1891 found that he unknowingly had it in his possession, and sent it to the Hawkeye-Record in 1943, asking "it to be turned over to the secretary of the Association with the warning that it should be kept somewhere so that future generations may have access to it. I think it is quite an heirloom for the High school as it contains a list of 246 of the early graduates of the school."

Among the charter members are Ethelda Burge, Cora Francher, Carrie Keyes, Anson Burge, Geneva Shantz, Maud McKean, Ella Davis, F.S. Alden, W.C. Alden, Chas. R. Keyes, Grace Foster, James R. Smith and Lois C. Miller. The organization was started June 11, 1890 with Ethelda Burge as president, W.C. Alden as secretary, and Carrie Keyes as treasurer. The Association started their first activity with a reception for the graduating class of 1890.

## HALSEY INDUCTED INTO VOLLEYBALL HALL OF FAME

Congratulations to Charles Halsey who was inducted into the Iowa Girls Volleyball Coaches and Officials Hall of Fame in November of 2007.

Charles taught biology and chemistry at Mount Vernon
High School from 1969-2001. In1972, as Title IX was changing the sports world by providing opportunities for young women to participate in high school athletics, principal Adrian Ringold asked Halsey to coach "extramural" girls' teams in basketball and volleyball. As a result of that pilot program, the school established formal programs in volleyball, basketball, and softball, hiring individual coaches for each sport. In 1973, Halsey turned over the coaching reigns to legendary Mount Vernon Coach, Shirley Ryan, but at the urging of Ringold, Halsey agreed to assist the school and its volleyball program by obtaining certification as a volleyball official.

In his 35-year officiating career, Halsey officiated over 2000 high school and middle school volleyball matches. He worked his first state tournament in 1975, just three years into his career. As one lowa's best referees, he has regularly been selected to officiate in the state volleyball tournament, working 11 state competitions in all. Throughout his career, Halsey has been devoted to continuously improving the level of high school volleyball officiating in lowa. He was instrumental in creating the East Central lowa Volleyball Officials Association.

Charles and Linda Halsey live in Mount Vernon. They have two daughters, Anne'92 of Chicago, and Gail Halsey Bertram'94 of Oshkosh, WI. In addition to continuing his officiating duties, Halsey currently serves at Cornell College as a chemistry lab instructor.
