### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Efficacy II

In my spring 2013 message I left you with a query: if you had the power, the capacity to produce an effect – to make a difference in a person's life or in a group of people's lives, would you chose to journey new pathways?

Over the course of the last three plus years as I indicated in my summer message, events and the people I have come into contact with have had a tremendous impact on my life. Good, bad, or somewhere in between, it is those people and more specifically those events that are guiding me towards new journeys.

In March of this year I went to a place emotionally I had never been, and it is a place I don't ever care to venture again. My bad for letting it get to the point it did. I cannot even begin to explain the overwhelming sense of disappointment, anger, and the sense of helplessness, that consumed me. Thank you to those individuals (and you know who you are) who stepped forward, listened, and got me refocused.

Like so many Mount Vernon alums and members of the Mount Vernon community, I have without reservation volunteered time and talent to a number of worthwhile events for the school district, the community, or a non-profit organization. And like so many others, we don't volunteer our time to gain praise and recognition; we don't volunteer our time for advancement of a personal agenda; and we certainly don't volunteer our time to be reminded that we are merely a volunteer (and to essentially stay in our sandbox). We volunteer and do what we do because we care. We volunteer because we believe so strongly in something for the betterment of others: a school district, an organization, a community, or a group of individuals.

Recently I've made some difficult decisions in terms of where and how I believe I will have the greater power, capacity, and ability to affect an individual's or group of individual's lives. It was a single individual that helped me realize that my passion has been right in front of me all along and it's really nothing more than what I have been doing for the past several years on one front, and what I have supported for many years on another.

Volunteering a few hours of your time in support of students has rewards beyond imagination. And while their appreciation and gratitude may not always come in the form of the spoken word, it is there. It may come in the form of a smile or casual gesture in passing, an extended hand, a pat on the back, a short and quickly written thank you note, and sometimes an unexpected hug.

So the next time you are approached to volunteer one, two, maybe three short hours of your time in support of students, I hope that you will do so like I have and will continue to do. But even more, if a student ever approaches you and asks for a moment of your time to talk, take the time to listen and talk to them; the rewards are beyond imagination.

Winner Darla Stoltz

Templeton'64 was nominated for this award by her classmate, Martha Dillow Shackford'64, who says Darla "is a rare treasure." Darla is completing her 31st year as Chief Executive Officer of the Epilepsy Foundation of Missouri & Kansas. Her accomplishments and awards within the Epilepsy Foundation are many. Her personal accomplishments include: Executive of the Year awarded by the Epilepsy Foundation - National Office, Guest expert on epilepsy for the Centers for Disease Control, President of the national organization of epilepsy affiliate executives, and member of the Epilepsy Foundation national board of directors.

As CEO, she has led her organization to honors such as: recipient of the first ever 'Affiliate of the Year' award by the Epilepsy Foundation National Office, two international awards for program excellence from the International Epilepsy Symposium, and an invitation to the White House by President Ronald Reagan with the national poster child from St. Louis. Darla was also invited to the White House by President George Bush for the signing of the Americans With Disabilities Act, invited to dinner with Barbara Bush when she was presented an honorary degree from St. Louis University, and invited by Ted Kennedy to organize a health care town hall meeting. She was also chair of the Management and Operations Team for the national Epilepsy Foundation and its affiliate network.





In her position she worked with both the national office and the affiliate network, along with George W. Bush, to restore the Americans With Disabilities Act. Darla has been interviewed on National Public Radio, cable television and in the Post Dispatch many times as an expert on epilepsy. In addition she has worked with many celebrities to promote epilepsy awareness, including St. Louis Cardinals Stan Musial and Steve Klein, and St. Louis Rams Kurt Warner, Keith Lyle, and Andy McCollum.

Outside of her work with the Epilepsy Foundation, she served on the Board of Directors for Childgrove School (a small private school with emphasis on diversity, disability integration and the arts), the Professional Advisory Board of the Emmaus Home (agency that provides residential support to people with disabilities), and served on and was Chair of the Kirkwood Disabled Awareness Advisory Commission. Darla created a new organization and served on the Board of Directors of Options for Justice (agency that provides support for people with disabilities who get incarcerated); organized, raised money for and provided a leadership retreat for all 50 executive directors of the epilepsy movement; was a Camp Fire Girl group leader; and completed training to be a VISTA member (as she prepares for what she will do in her retirement).

During high school Darla participated in a variety of activities including: year book staff (editor her senior year); Student Council (Vice President her senior year); Chalkmark all 4 years; all-school play 3 years; Declam; Youth Center; Talent Show; Girls Recreation Association all 4 years (president her senior year).

by Don Stine, says he "was fortunate to have two lowa Bandmaster 'legends' as his mentors: Ken Smykil and Don Stine. (Smykil was his instructor prior to high school, Don Stine was his high school band director)." Bill was very active in his high school band program. He was a member of every possible performing group and was very active each year in the State Solo and Ensemble Contests. His career at Mount Vernon culminated his senior year with a successful audition and acceptance into the Iowa All-State Band, and a performance as the featured soloist with the Mount Vernon Concert Band, which was selected as an Honor Band for the 1972 Iowa Bandmasters Conference.

Bill attended Coe College on a music scholarship, where he studied trumpet with Paul Smoker. At Coe he was a featured soloist with both the concert band and jazz bands. He also won first chair trumpet in the Mid-American Intercollegiate Honor Band and performed regularly with the Cedar Rapid Symphony. Since then Bill has continued with course work at the University of Iowa, where he studied conducting with Myron Welch, and played with many freelance and community bands, including the Des Moines Big Band.

Bill's 37 year teaching career includes 31 years of high school experience at Panora-Linden, Cherokee, Carlisle, Centerville, and City High in Iowa City. He is currently the band director at South East Junior High in Iowa City. Bands under his direction have been very active and successful in both state and national music contests. Jazz Bands under his direction qualified for the Iowa Jazz Championships annually and included many top five finishes with the Centerville and City High Jazz Bands. Most recently the two South East Jazz Bands under his direction placed 1st and 2nd in their division at the South East Iowa Bandmasters Association Jazz Festival. Jazz Bands under his direction were selected as the Honor Band to perform at the Iowa Bandmaster Conference in 1996 (Centerville) and 2000 and 2003 with City High. He was also co-director for the City High Concert Band when it was selected as the Honor Band for the same Conference in 1999 and 2002. During his tenure at City High the Music Department was recognized 3 times by the Grammy Foundation as a Signature Gold School for its' performance excellence.

Bill was named Teacher of the Year in 1995 at Centerville where he also served as President and Chief Negotiator for the Centerville Education Association. He has also been elected and served as President of the South Central Iowa Bandmasters Association, and the lowa Association of Jazz Educators.



Service winner Richard 'Dick' McKeen'51 was nominated for this award by alum David Wolfe'50. A graduate of both Mount Vernon and Cornell College, he continues to remain active as Class Reunion Agent in both schools. He has made arrangements for tri-class Reunions of the 1949, 1950 and 1951 Mount Vernon classes every five years for the last 35-40 years. In addition Dick plans the reunions for the Cornell Class of 1955, and is now serving his second term as a member of the Cornell College Alumni Board of Directors.

Wolfe'50 gives award to Dick at the Award Ceremony

After college and then military duty, Dick started a career in sales, including the last 38 of 56 years in Real Estate. Dick says "I not only enjoyed a successful career in the business but I have enjoyed several leadership roles. I have been a believer in giving back." As a result Dick has contributed in leadership as the local President, State of Iowa President and National Regional Vice President of the National Association of Realtors, serving eight years as a National Director and member or chair of several committees on each level. His favorite role in the National Association was the Liaison to First District Congressman Jim Leach for a period of over ten years. The duty called for Dick to travel to Washington. D.C. for the annual 'Hill Visits', the nationwide meeting of the Legislative Leaders of the National Association from all states of the United States in lobbying efforts for the benefits of Home Owners throughout the country. His year as the Regional Vice President of Region Eight, Iowa, Nebraska, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota allowed him to serve on the Executive Committee, the 45 member committee making executive decisions for over one million realtors throughout the United States. Other roles and honors during his Real Estate career included: Iowa Association of Realtors Realtor of the Year in 1998, Realtor PAC Chair for five years, Golden R in 1990 for PAC contributions, and National Realtor PAC Committee Member for seven years.

In lowa City Dick has supported numerous University of Iowa Athletic programs. Dick initiated and was asked to be the Founding Member of the Johnson County "I" Club. He was honored by becoming a member of the National "I" Club Board of Directors in 1973, named President of the National "I" Club Board of Directors in 1976, and "I" Club Man of the Year in 1976, and continues in these activities today. He has been on the Rotary-Ronald McDonald Golf Board for over ten years, which raises an average of \$50,000 annually for support of families of McDonald House patients.

Dick became a member of the University of Iowa Presidents Club in 1975, and was a member of the fund raising Steering Committee for both Carver Hawkeye Arena and the Medical Education Research Facility. He is a member of Friends of University of Iowa Hospital and Clinics, and served as Chair from 2003–2008. Dick participated as a member of the Big, Better, Best Steering Committee, representing the University Hospitals and Clinics in the 1.2 Billion Fund raising completed in 2008. He has been on the Holden Comprehensive Cancer Advisory Board.

Dick says he shares many of the service projects with his wife, Kathleen."We have worked together and complemented each other in our many advocacy endeavors. Our advocacy involvements have been our way of giving back to our past. It has been a wonderful life."

MVCSD Community Impact winner Karen Jilovec Martin'57 is the first recipient of this new Alumni Association Hall of Fame Award. This award recognizes an alumna for their service impact on the Mount Vernon Community. Nominated by her sister, Kay Jilovec Lind'55, Karen is an alum who was active in school, married an alum and settled in Mount Vernon, built a local business, raised a 'Mustang' family, and has always been an active member of the community.

In high school Karen lettered four years in music, Glee Club and Chorus. She was a PTA candidate and in her senior year was a Homecoming queen candidate. She still serves as her class treasurer.

She earned her real estate license in 1974 and her broker's license in 1978. She opened her own office Mount Vernon, Farm and Home Realty in 1980 on main street, retiring in 2008 after 35 years.

Karen has served on the city's Planning and Zoning Committee. She was a member of the Mustang Booster Club, serving as secretary and treasurer for approximately 12 years. She ordered food and coordinated the concession stand for sports events such as basketball, football and wrestling. At Hillcrest Country Club she has taken care of flower beds for 25 years and served on the Hillcrest Women's Board for many years, including chair of the "Save the Barn" effort.






Athletic Hall of Fame winner Dennis Wolrab'64 was nominated for his award

by fellow alum Martin Pitlik'63. Marty says "Denny was an outstanding athlete and an individual identified by our competition as someone to be concerned about in all sports." During high school Dennis was an all-sports athlete, participating in baseball 5 years (playing varsity when he was in 8th grade), and 4 years each in basketball, football, and track, lettering 16 times. He participated in cross country for 1 year and M Club for 4 years. While in high school he was also in choir for 4 years, was Class Treasurer his junior year, and was selected as escort for Homecoming Court candidate Darla Stoltz.

Dennis's accomplishments in high school athletics are: In 1962 Dennis broke the 440 run record held by Bud Kudart set in 1947; held conference individual and relay race records from 1962 which held for approximately 30 years; at State won first place in the 440 and placed in the 220 and ½ mile; held nine different school individual and relay records; qualified for State in broad jump for three consecutive years; placed in indoor and outdoor track events at the State meet; was All-State in football, baseball, and track, and was All-State honorable mention in basketball.

Back then, we had no track to run on. We also played basketball at Cornell College because our team had such a huge following and the high school gym could

He served 25 years on both the Executive Board and the Examining Board for Ironworkers Local 89, and nine years as a North Central District Council officer.





A favorite memory of your time at Mount Vernon Schools -- or of a favorite teacher perhaps?





## Mustangs...What Are They Doing Now?

# What have you been doing since you left Mount Vernon High School?

I've largely continued my education, starting at Mount Mercy University in Cedar Rapids where I received a Bachelor of Science in Computer Science and Mathematics. I took a brief break from academia and provided IT consulting services for businesses in the Cedar Rapids area after college. I apparently couldn't resist another half decade's worth of schooling, so now I'm at the University of Notre Dame working to-



wards my PhD in Computer Science. I expect to graduate next summer. I met my wife, Rachel, while I attended Mount Mercy University. Our bouncing baby boy, Ronan, joined the family in March, 2012.

#### What do you do now?

I'm part computer vision researcher, part data scientist and part software engineer. I primarily focus on automatic face recognition in uncontrolled environments. Researchers across academia and industry have devised fairly accurate systems for identifying people from controlled images such as driver's license photos. In these types of settings, individuals must face the camera with a particular expression, the lighting is uniform and the camera focus is typically set well. Limiting the extent to which people can change appearance between pictures makes recognition easier for automated systems.

Now imagine trying to program a computer to recognize faces in arbitrary pictures. Head pose, facial expression and lighting patterns will generally vary between different images of the same face. The recent experiences of law enforcement agencies involved with the Boston Marathon bombing investigations showed that current face recognition technology is not ready to handle all of these factors at once. I'm working on filling this gap, while applying face recognition tools to identify social structures and detect people of interest in natural scenes.

#### An accomplishment you are proud of?

I've had the privilege of contributing to a face recognition application for law enforcement officials, the Universal Face Workstation (UFW). The software had a spot on 60 Minutes that you can see at http://www.cbsnews.com/video/watch/?id=50147167n.

# A favorite memory or two of your time at Mount Vernon Schools – or of a favorite teacher perhaps?

Wrestling was a big part of my life all throughout high school, both on and off the mat. The wrestling team had a tradition of eating at Ryan's Family Steakhouse. One time, I joined fellow wrestlers Derek Feaker and Derek Alger to enjoy some fine dining at Ryan's. I tried to get a rise out of Alger by messing with his food. As Robert Frost's poem says, "Two roads diverged in a wood, and I, I took the one less traveled by, And that has made all the difference." Actually I've taken many roads less traveled and in a variety of directions. So what have I been doing since I left Mount Vernon High School?

First stop was college at the University of Iowa. I had no clue what I wanted to be when I grew up and kept ending up in writing courses so I applied for and was accepted into the undergraduate writer's workshop in poetry. Eventually, with an English degree in hand, I found work at American College Testing (ACT) in Iowa City, and took graduate courses to work toward my teaching credential. Student teaching made me think, good grief, I'll never be able to excite and teach high school students so I continued to work at ACT.

Then, on an outing at the Mount Vernon A&W with my disabled father, my life changed when I bought a lotto ticket. I won \$1,000 and thought, this is my ticket out of lowa! I gave notice to my employer and piled myself into my silver blue Volkswagen Super-beetle and took interstate 80 to California, where I've been since 1987. After five years in California one is considered a native. Truth be told though, I am always an lowan and make that known to all I meet.

Needing a sane reason to explain why I was picking up and moving to the Left Coast, I enrolled in graduate school to study Public Relations. When I arrived in the San Francisco Bay Area I felt like I was living the life of Mary Ann, Armistead Maupin's character in "Tales of the City". I worked with a consulting firm that had educational contracts to develop curriculum for local utility districts. I got really good at volunteering for non-profits such as a local concert series, church, affordable housing agencies. I learned it's not a good thing to simply be a volunteer in the Bay Area with its high cost of living.

Finally I landed a job using my marketing skills in the financial world, giving me a chance to learn about mortgage lending. I worked with Reverse Mortgages and then moved on to working at a bank with home mortgages and affordable housing programs as an underwriter, an administrator, a trainer, a manager. I enjoyed good paychecks and lots of travel, which was always a perk of the job! I grew into the San Francisco signature attire of black suit and briefcase. I enjoyed beautiful views from my office, living in Russian Hill and then Pacific Heights, great restaurants for business lunches, and frequent flyers miles to feed my vacation adventures. It was a kick for awhile to live the city life that I always dreamed of while living on a farm.

In the midst of this, I got married. The corporate world and values that came with that world were wearing me down. When I was working to get the employees I managed a 25 cent an hour raise and saw the excess income the owners of the company had, it was frustrating to experience the materialism of the corporate world.

Eventually, I was downsized and rather than take an offer for another corporate job, I worked on our project to have kids. I won the lotto again with twins and took a on most challenging and rewarding job as Mom. I call Grace and Jeremy my prophets for I guide and teach them, however I have learned more from them! They are now freshmen at Berkeley High School, which is very different from my high school experience. One of my MVHS friends commented, "How did you get two jocks for kids?", as my children are far more athletic than I.

Work-wise, I started to work from home as a consultant and led workshops and retreats about photo preservation and scrapbooking. I began focusing for myself and others about our purpose and meaning in this life. I kept volunteering, which included a six year stint facilitating a support group at

a local hospital for new and expectant parents of twins and triplets. I also started exploring birthing and pre/perinatal psychology and served on boards of organizations focused on family building options such as adoption and assisted reproduction.

In the midst of raising kids and volunteering I started taking classes at a community center about building and construction. My husband and I bought a Victorian fixer house and I spent five years rehabilitating and restoring the house. I get to live in that house now and enjoy the fruits of my major labor and will most likely check house renovation off my list, never to be done again.

I continued to serve my church, both locally and nationally. In 2004, when I was a commissioner to our Presbyterian national General Assembly, we took many actions around the Middle East. My life became immersed interpreting our Assembly's actions about a region of the world I never dreamed of, nor understood from my lowa roots.

I worked to learn more and became very involved with the interfaith community of the Abrahamic faiths. In 2006 I was asked to go to a peace conference in Bethlehem and took a side trip to Lebanon to visit the oldest Christian Seminary in the Middle East. By 2008 I was working with that seminary as a Presbyterian Mission Worker assigned to Syria and Lebanon. I worked as a Fundraiser and US liaison for the seminary. My 'job' was to immerse myself in learning about the region and then to help share and educate people in the

US about the churches, ministries and people of the Middle East. Our seminary alumni become leaders within their communities providing schools, medical services, and when needed, shelters for refugees.

This was serious work assisting alumni with a consultation of church leaders from Syria, Lebanon and Iraq, helping facilitate the sharing of stories and support among one another as Iraqi's faced ongoing trauma and struggles. In my job, I moved from to the levity of dancing with bedouins in a tent in the middle of the Syrian Desert on the old Silk Road; to traveling to the Cedars of Lebanon and Khalil Ğibran's birthplace (one of my favorite poets) and eating lunch by a waterfall where he lived and created his art. My relationships with people in the Middle East taught me much about human perseverance and joy in the midst of struggle.

As it became clear my position in the Middle East would be ending, I was led toward a new career that used my experiences. I had been with both of my parents through longterm illness and déath. I held my father as he died after years of disability. Likewise, I was able to be with my mother at the end of her life in a hospice facility. I didn't have an 'Ozzie and Harriet' upbringing, and had grown to learn how to understand, reconcile and forgive my parents. By accompanying the two most pivotal people who brought me life, through the good, the bad and the ugly and toward the ultimate light, I learned to appreciate the richness of human experience. This gift helps me to accompany others. I applied and was accepted to a year-long Residency program in Chaplaincy at Stanford Hospitals and Clinics. I made it through a very challenging and growing year and now work as a Hospice Chaplain, and continue to do on call shifts at the Hospital, as needed. Chaplaincy feels natural for me, and provides a different type of travel that has taken me far beyond any geographic destination ever could.

When I sat in class during high school, I remember looking out the window at the cornfields that were there at that time, and dreaming of going out into the world to experience people and places different than me. My life has taught me to expect the unexpected, and I have

traveled physically and mentally far beyond what I dreamed.

So many teachers I had at Mount Vernon Schools provided lessons I could not fully realize until I was gone from school. A few examples were the English department: Gladys Rife, Sandra Bolton, Ruth Michaud and Donna Jacobs. Each steered me toward a love of reading, creative writing and expression that has been my compass. Poets, choral reading, yearbook, journal writing, public speaking and essays all came to life in high school. As technology has evolved, all those skills are still used and have enhanced new ways of communicating through social media, blogs, and media presentations. My English classes unlocked the creativity and fun that can be had putting information forth in the world.

Sophomore year Mrs. Rife taught me how to research and organize a speech. When I have been asked to preach or speak in front of large audiences in the US or abroad, I use techniques Mrs. Rife taught me. After preparation which includes identifying my audience, I confidently share and speak with diction, tone and pauses; and above all, I speak from the heart.

Four years of Spanish provided many opportunities to try to convince Nancy Swisher to let us have a fiesta day instead of studying boring grammar and vocabulary. Years later when I was in Costa Rica, at the end of two weeks Spanish immersion, I found myself engaged in a conversation (albeit with baby Spanish) with a Jewish family about what it was like to live in a country that is predominately Catholic. I thought, "Muchas gracias, Señora Swisher!"

One of the most important lessons I learned was in band from Don Stine. I was a percussionist and we tried out for parts. I wanted one of the exciting drum parts. He gave me the triangle part. I was disappointed, angry and a bit of a brat, thinking the triangle part was below my skills. Mr. Stine gave me a strong reprimand and said something about it doesn't matter what the part is, but what I would bring to it. He went on to say that in life I may get the triangle parts... whatever my role, big or small, it would be the passion and enthusiasm

I brought that would define my success. Well, Mr. Stine was right. Throughout life I have found the passion and enthusiasm in where I'm led. And I've used that speech with my own children. And I am so grateful for that huge lesson through what seemed to be a little triangle piece!

For now I continue to serve as a Chaplain and look forward to that evolving career. I have been an ordained Elder within my church since the 80's and have been taking classes toward commissioning as a Lay Pastor within the Presbyterian church—PC(USA).

I've learned how to say yes to those things that challenge and inspire, however big or small. Likewise, I've learned to say no to things. If it doesn't fit the gifts I bring, there is someone else that will fit better and bring the energy that task or job deserves. I've learned the bumps in the road are also a part of the journey. I've learned not to take for granted the value of each day we have on this earth. And I've learned I have a choice of how I process whatever comes my way and use it for growth to move forward.

Mine has not been the predictable road life that I thought would happen. Instead I have taken many unpredictable roads. I first explored Robert Frost's poem "The Road Not Taken" in a MVHS class with Gladys Rife. I'm proud to be from Mount Vernon Schools, and give thanks to the teachers and the community for helping me on my many roads. I've got a few more to go... can't wait to see where they lead!

# Mustangs...What Are They Doing Now?

#### **■ STEVE EDWARDS'65**

After graduating from MVHS, I went to the University of Iowa where I became very active in the Writers Workshop and played in a very successful rock and roll band, the Friars. I almost pursued a career in creative writing but ended up at the University of Virginia Law School where I decided to get serious and finished in the top 3% of my class.

That enabled me to land a job at Cravath, Swaine & Moore in New York, regarded by many as the top law firm in the country at the time, where I represented clients like CBS and IBM.


I left Cravath in 1980 and formed my own law firm – Davis, Weber & Edwards – which merged with Hogan & Hartson, a Washington, D.C. firm, and I became head of their Litigation Department in New York.

In 2010, Hogan & Hartson merged with Lovells, a U.K. firm, to become Hogan Lovells, the sixth largest firm in the world with 2,600 lawyers.

Probably my greatest accomplishment was becoming President of the Federal Bar Council, a bar association of approximately 3,500 lawyers who practice in the federal courts in New York. That has enabled me to work very closely with most of the federal judges in New York, and it has brought me into contact with most of the Supreme Court Justices, including Justices Alito, Breyer, Ginsburg, Kennedy, Scalia, Sotomayor and Thomas, as well as my former partner Chief Justice John Roberts.

In 2010, the Federal Bar Council gave me its Whitney North Seymour Award for Public Service by a Private Practitioner for my service as President of Nazareth Housing, which provides housing to the homeless, Treasurer of the National Center for Law and Economic Justice, which represents low income people in impact litigation and the Executive Committee member of the Jazz Foundation of America, which helps jazz musicians who are in need.

In 2003, I wrote a rock opera, "There's Something Afoot," which has been performed three times in New York, and in 2011, I wrote a play, "The Trial of Harry S Truman, which has been performed twice.

I never thought I would say this, but the over 54 years that have transpired since I graduated from good old MVHS have practically flown by! The first five years were spent at lowa State where I received my BS in Industrial Administration (i.e., Business Adm) in 1964. In college I helped colonize the ISU chapter of Alpha Kappa Lambda fraternity, holding a number of offices including chapter president. I also participated in lots of intramural sports, attended as many ISU sports events as my schedule would allow (maybe too many!), and worked part time in the Memorial Union and as a waiter in a girls' dorm. For several summers I ran the pro shop at Hillcrest Country Club in Mount Vernon and tried (unsuccessfully) to match my brother Randy's prowess on the golf course! I also worked the second shift at Collins Radio for two summers manufacturing parts for aeronautical communications systems.

Within the first month after graduating from ISU, I began my career with Bankers Life Company (now known as Principal Financial), moved to Des Moines and got married. This marriage lasted ten years, resulting in three talented children and five wonderful grandchildren (so far!).

While at Bankers Life/Principal I worked primarily in Information Technology positions, such as computer programming, systems analysis and email administration. In 1978 I married my current wife of 35 years, Mary Ann. To this union came a step daughter, a second daughter and three more fine grandchildren (that's eight so far!).

From 1968 through 1978, I became heavily involved in the Des Moines Jaycees, serving as chapter president in 1977-78 and receiving a JCI Senatorship in 1978. In December of 2005, I officially retired after 41<sup>1/2</sup> years of service to my first and only employer! I still stay in touch with many fellow retirees through biweekly breakfasts, serving on the Principal Retiree Committee for four years, attending special retiree events, and playing golf, tennis, etc.

Although officially retired, I don't lack for things to do. I actively collect (my wife swears I have OCD!) many things, including Drake Relays and Bankers Life/Principal Financial memorabilia, antique golf and tennis equipment, and autographs of famous athletes, especially in the sports of track and field and golf. I also buy and sell used golf equipment on Craig's List. This gives me a good excuse (and extra \$\$) to go to garage sales, flea markets and auctions, where I occasionally find some "goodies" for my various collections.

I have competed in the Iowa Games and

lowa Senior Olympics for the last 23 years, primarily in track and field events (50-800 meters, high jump, long jump, triple jump, javelin, hurdles, etc.) Barring a serious injury, I hope to qualify next year to compete in either the 2015 National Senior Games or the 2015 State Games of America. In addition, I occasionally play golf, tennis, horseshoes and disc golf with other retiree friends.

Other activities include helping raise a 17 year old granddaughter who lives with us in Johnston, lowa, photography, volunteering as a marshall each year at the Principal Charity Classic Golf Tournament, serving on the Board of Directors of the lowa Senior Olympics, donating blood (in December I will reach the 25 gallon milestone), displaying many of my collections at the Johnston Public Library and at Principal Financial retiree events, and spoiling two very active young grandsons who live in nearby Des Moines.

I am still a big fan of ISU athletic teams. I also root for the Hawkeyes, Panthers and Bulldogs, except when they are playing ISU!

Last but not least, I still follow the achievements of the Mustang sports teams in the newspaper, on the internet and on television. I especially enjoy watching the track teams perform at Drake Stadium in the Drake Relays and the State Coed Track Meet.

#### The Drake Relays

I have had a "love affair" with the Drake Relays ever since 1958, the year MVHS track coach Don Hipple brought some of the track team to Des Moines to witness 'America's Athletic Classic' first-hand. I returned the following year for the Golden Anniversary Drake Relays and was treated not only to outstanding athletic performances on the track but also to the induction of the inaugural Drake Relays Hall of Fame class, including such legendary track stars as Jesse Owens and Al Oerter. By this time, I already considered the Relays as my favorite spectator event!

In the last 56 years, I have missed only one day of the Friday and Saturday programs. (While at ISU, I even hitch-hiked from my fraternity house to Drake Stadium and back each year in complete safety!) Over this period I have collected countless programs (I only need six more to have a complete set),

medals, trophies, watches, ticket stubs, photos and autographs. I proudly display parts of my collection at Drake's Knapp Center on Thursday and Friday of the Drake Relays each year. Many have commented that this is the most extensive collection of Drake Relays memorabilia that they have ever seen! Please stop by and check it out if you're ever in the Des Moines area the last weekend in April!

Some of my most prized Drake Relays possessions (see photo on previous page) include an autographed framed 1997 program cover featuring a photo I took of the legendary Michael Johnson in 1996 (a few months before he won three gold medals at the Atlan-

ta Olympics) and a silver-plated traveling trophy given to the winning university two mile relay teams from 1925 through 1933. Other favorites include a 1967 champion's watch with its leather band signed by Jim Ryun from Kansas, the first to ever record a sub four minute mile at Drake, a Drake Relays program autographed by Jesse Owens, and a 2009 Centennial program autographed by all the living members of the 20 member Drake Relays Athletes of the Century.

In 2006 Drake University launched a project to create an online digital archive of the history of the Drake Relays. When I learned of this project, I volunteered to loan a large number of photos I had taken at the Relays over the years to be digitized for inclusion in this archive. #### Favorite memories of my years in the Mount Vernon Schools

One favorite memory was competing in the State Team Mile Race on the U of I track each Fall. Between 1956 and 1958 our team placed 5th, 4th, and 2nd despite being the smallest school in our division. My teammates included Doug Macauley, Bob Bowman, Tom Wilkinson and Jim Jamison (I apologize if I forgot anyone!). Even though this race was run on a 440 yard track it was considered a 'cross country' race and usually included from 50 to 65 runners on the track at one time. Beside winning coveted state meet medals, our team was also given free tickets to the U of I football game that same afternoon at Kinnick Stadium. It was a real treat to watch some of Evy's best teams dismantle the opposition!

Other fond memories include practicing track events on the 390 yard track around the football field, hosting track meets on Cornell's cinder track at Ash Park, holding summer band concerts at City Park, having Jon (Fuzz) Swanberg live with me his senior year, "Chet Tie Day" honoring Coach Chet Wallace and the very wide and flowery neckties he loved to wear, taking bus tours with our concert band and choral groups to small high schools around the state, and getting permission from Leo Gerst for Ron Hess and me to leave school early one Thursday to play (and win trophies!) in one of the Men's Stag Golf Tournaments at Hillcrest Country Club.
