

What have you been doing since you left Mount Vernon High School? As much as I consider Mount Vernon my alma mater, some may remember that I left in January of my senior year. Unfortunately, this was due to several family and financial issues we were having at the time that had been building for many years.

After high school, I attended the University of lowa, where I changed my major several times before finally settling on binge drinking. As it turned out, that was a poor decision and led to me flunking out in my second semester. Eventually, I was able to find some stability and direction in my life and returned to night school at Kirkwood and then the University of lowa, this time majoring in History and Economics. During this time, my wife and I established a family while I developed a career in industrial sales and sales management in Eastern lowa.

In 2004, we decided to take a page out of Monty Python's Flying Circus, "And now for something completely different," when we moved to St. Louis so I could attend seminary. After graduating with a Master of Divinity in 2007, we returned to plant a church in lowa City called One Ancient Hope. That church started the summer of the 2008 floods and the height of the Great Recession, yet just bought their first building in downtown lowa City directly across the street from Burge Hall.

We left lowa City in 2015 and moved to Chicago, where we lead another church through a reorganization. During this

time, I also served as the Chicago City Director for the Kern Family Foundation's initiative to help pastors better care for their congregant's vocational lives. Additionally, I began regularly participating in the Acton Institute; a Catholic-affiliated think tank devoted to contemplating the intersection of faith, political philosophy, and economic theory.

What do you do now? In 2018, I was offered and accepted a position leading our denomination's ministry to those serving in Washington DC. We do not lobby for political causes, but rather seek to provide pastoral care to elected officials and their staffs. My days are spent in leading Bible studies and in one-on-one meetings with members of Congress from both sides of the aisle, Cabinet officials, and their staffs. In addition to handling the business of the country, they are real people struggling with work-life balance, family concerns, financial pressures, health issues, uncertainty about the future, and a frequent sense of futility. For all the media rhetoric, all of these officials are genuinely pursuing the flourishing of the people they represent. It is a pleasure to serve them.

I also spend time waiting for grandchildren!

What accomplishment are you most proud of? As a result of some of the events that occurred while we were in Mount Vernon, my mother eventually had a breakdown which resulted in her homelessness and later death. I believe

God used these experiences to develop my deep sense of perseverance and compassion. These traits became central to the church in lowa City, where we coordinated over 1,000 volunteers from across the country to help with flood clean-up and repairs. We also worked to care for the local homeless community by distributing sleeping bags each winter, welcoming them as a regular part of our church, and collaborating to open an extreme-weather shelter.

A favorite memory or two of your time at Mount Vernon Schools -- or of a favorite teacher perhaps? Honestly, I don't think I would have made it through high school without four teachers. Mr. Halsey, Mr. Peters, and Mr. Silliman were aware of what was going on in our home and the struggles that I was having in holding it together. Each of them made it a point to say check-in and say encouraging words to me. Mrs. Michaud pushed me hard to dig deep, work harder, and never took my excuses for sub-par effort.



What have you been doing since you left Mount Vernon High School?

them and grow artistically as a team. We work with so many talented artists.


A favorite memory or two of your time at Mount Vernon Schools -- or of a favorite teacher?

Mike Seiler here... MVHS Class of 1967. I've lived in the semi-rural community of Bonita, CA for the last 30 or so years and have been "retired" for about eleven years now. I gave 40 years to the U.S. Navy (6 years active, 34 years U.S. Civil Service) and have been increasingly involved with volunteer community service in Bonita, San Diego County, and the City of La Mesa, CA. Here's a sampling: Board President of the Sweetwater Valley Civic Association (helping make our Bonita-Sweetwater Valley area one of the best places to live in San Diego County); Board President of Bonita Highlands Homeowners' Association (common area oversight for 667 residences); Planning Commissioner for San Diego County since 2014 (Chairman this year); active Past Master of La Mesa Masonic Lodge and member of the Scottish Rite and the AL Bahr Shrine organizations (all with noble philanthropic endeavors for children); Chaplain, Historian, and Judge Advocate for American Legion Post 282, in La Mesa; Board President for a non-profit watchdog corporation (keeping water rates low). Plus I try to meet with a group of 10-15 guys for breakfast just about every Wednesday.

I receive no salary or significant compensation for my volunteer services with the above groups. What motivates me to engage in these efforts are the Midwestern community core values instilled in me as I grew up in Mt. Vernon, Iowa. While honed by college and adult experiences, the basic skills and values were nevertheless engrained in me by my parents, grandfather, MVHS teachers, and even a dose of MVHS Principals (Mssrs. Addis and Ringold). I still take people at their word, "act on the square," and strive to live by San Diego County's motto: "The noblest motive is the public good." I expect that many other MVHS graduates do the same. I hope so, anyway. Go Mustanas! Proud to be one.

My favorite teacher was probably Mrs. Gladys Rife (English department chair, school play Director, Velvet Curtain sponsor, and many other tasks I'm sure). I'd heard about how tough she was before I took her first English class in my sophomore year. So on the first day I was pretty apprehensive. That all ceased as soon as she began our

first class. She began by reading some poetry or prose to us.

Until that moment in time, I had never heard anyone read anything with such grace and style. I was absolutely enraptured by her thoughtful, poised delivery. What voice control! What diction! What feeling! I frankly wasn't even listening to what she was reading because it didn't matter... I had met my first true Thespian! Hanging on almost her every word, I remember thinking, "This is how you should read something aloud."

My thoughts were still focused on her impressive delivery when she finished reading, paused to look around the classroom with a thoughtful stare, focused her gaze on me, and asked, "Mr. Seiler, what did that passage mean to you?"

Good grief! I don't recall what I said, but I undoubtedly stammered some sort of response that was undoubtedly the antithesis of what I had just been admiring so much in her. I recall that she took mercy on me after a few agonizing seconds and moved on to another student for his or her opinion. She must have recognized my "deer-in-theheadlights" look, but from that day on, I had immense respect for her ability to teach English, speech, diction, the "dramatic pause," and her firm but caring demeanor in whatever she was doing. She was not to be feared: she was someone to emulate! I remember her often whenever I have to give a speech or analyze an acting part in a play or ceremony.

Other notable teachers back in that day were Mr. Ken Smykil (Band Director) for his ability to "heard cats" and "make silk purses out of sow's ears" with the kids in the MVHS marching and concert bands. He literally marched the band through the streets of Mt. Vernon's "North Side" for hours on some summer evenings prior to the annual Eastern lowa Band contests. Having served in U.S. Marines, he wanted to ensure that we could handle the long parades of the contests.

Then there was Mrs. Helen Colon (home economics) who started the "Boys Cooking Class" (who would have thought it would be such a success?), and of course Mr. Chester (Chet) Wallace (History, Wood Shop, Athletic Coach) who also owned a farm, and whose cow sometimes showed up at homecoming pep rallies (one year even "on stage" in the old MVHS building).

Lastly, probably a seldom remembered teacher, Mrs. Fossler (I don't recall her first name), who taught typing and secretarial skills, among other things. I took a semester of typing from her one year, learned to

touch type, and have often thanked my lucky stars for taking her class. Who would have thought that most of us would need to type on a computer keyboard as part of our daily lives. "A S D F G H J K L;"... over and over, and over again. :-)

If you aren't already bored with this, I'll share one more anecdote on Mr. Chet Wallace with you: He taught his history classes so often and without major curriculum changes that I believe he literally lectured using only his autonomic nervous system ("spinal cord") memory. One day I was sitting in front of his somewhat tedious World History class with my good friend and classmate (now Doctor) Tim Thomson sitting in the desk next to me. We both took pretty good class notes and for about the first 15 minutes or so everything was pretty normal in the class (that is to say it was boring). Taking notes help us relieve the tedium.

Suddenly the basement classroom door opened and someone stuck their head inside to advise Mr. Wallace that he had a phone call or message in the front office. He left the room for about ten minutes and, when he returned, he continued with his lecture. But instead of starting where he had left off, he began repeating his lecture, almost verbatim, from the very start of class. I looked over at Tim, and we both had the same idea.

I raised my hand just before he was about to tell us about some (boringly) noteworthy fact about someone or some place, and said, "You know, Mr. Wallace, I'll bet that" and I repeated what he was about to tell us from my notes. He looked at me in surprise and said something like, "Why yes, Seiler, that is correct." Then he went on with his lecture. After a few sentences, Tim raised his hand and did the same thing that I'd done. Chet was again surprised and said something like, "Well, yes, Thomson, that is what happened."

I believe we each pulled that same trick on him one more time before he stopped lecturing and looked at us both. "OK, what are you two up to?"

When we explained his "reset/repeat" lecture, Chet was a bit embarrassed, but he smiled and chuckled before asking us what the last item in our notes was. He then pressed on with his lecture... and we took notes... to relieve the tedium. I hope he at least appreciated that we had been taking notes.

The work of Amelia Carl Kibbie, a 2020 MV alum and now a Lisbon teacher, is in the hands of some of the most talented actors, writers and producers in Hollywood. One of Kibbie's stories is in an anthology included in the gift bag that is part of





the Golden Globes. Celebrities receiving the book include nominees and presenters such as Lady Gaga, Bradley Cooper, Tina Fey, Benedict Cumberbatch, Glenn Close, Hugh Grant, Elisabeth Moss and Emma Stone.

Amelia said she's ecstatic that her work is included in the red carpet gift bags. "The idea of someone like Lady Gaga, Tina Fey or Benedict Cumber-batch reading my story just makes my head spin," she said. "Of course, every writer dreams of something they've written being turned into a movie. Perhaps a Hollywood insider might read my story, follow up with the upcoming novel, and decide to make a film based on my work. "That would be my big dream."

Her story, "Idylls of the King," is included in the Running Wild Press Anthology of Stories Volume II. Her story is about two boys evacuated from London as part of Operation Pied Piper during WWII. She originally wrote it hoping to be part of an anthology with a writing prompt of a knight with a "heart of steel." "I knew a lot of people submitting would be writing medieval or fantasy fiction. I wanted to go a different direction, so I set my story during WWII and incorporated Arthurian myth," she said. "Yes, a suit of armor and a sword do make an appearance in the story."

Kibbie's work wasn't included in that particular anthology, but she loved it so much she continued submitting it, and "Idylls of the King" found a home with Running Wild Press. Running Wild Press is a California-based publishing house run ex-clusively by women with a mission to publish writing that doesn't fit neatly into a box. Working with Running Wild Press, Kibbie will continue the story of the characters introduced in "Idylls of the King" in a novel titled "Legendary," which will be published later this year.

For over 13 years I have been far removed from both Iowa and the United States by living in Colombia, South America. Being able to receive this news on the internet, helps fill one of the voids of living so far away from my origins.

As a member of the class of 1951 it is hard to realize that was a long 68 years ago. I remember coming to Mount Vernon as a freshman in 1947 and not knowing anyone, except the few students like myself who were coming from the Ely area that closed its high school in 1946. One thing that still sticks in my mind was the photos of prior graduating classes in the hallways, going back to earlier years. I recognized one student in the 1932 class picture and thought, what a long time ago! This makes me wonder what an incoming freshman would think looking at a graduation picture from 1951?

Both my wife and I have continued to have the most important thing, good health, as the years mount up. For nearly 12 years we resided at two different locations in a small and then medium sized town in the Eastern Andes mountain chain. Two years ago we visited the city of Medellin for the first time. It is know as the city of Eternal Spring and located in the Western or Pacific mountain Andes chain. Doing some touring of the area we also visited a small town (of 7 thousand plus population) situated 50 miles South of Medellin. This resulted in us purchasing over an acre plot of ground, walking distance from town, on a large lovely artificial lake surrounding the area. A SMALL WORLD STORY







Editor's Note: Author Jim Jandik, who lives on the other side of the state, wanted to see the surprise on 1984 alum Colleen Corcoran Schutt's face when she first read this story. So, we kept it a surprise, asking Colleen to 'trust us, we have a good surprise for you, a story you will want to read.' Into our office she came, a little wary, but trusting. And indeed, she had a 'good surprise' as you can see by the photos above that we were able to share with Jim.

By the time most of us reach middle age, we have heard of or are part of a small world story. Here is

my small world story that I would like to share with you.

My name is Jim Jandik. I was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa and I grew up in a modest house on the northwest side of the city. Both of my parents were of Czech descent. In fact, going back at least five generations, all of my ancestors can trace their roots to the Bohemia region of what was the Austria-Hungarian Empire (Czechoslovakia was not formed as a country until 1918 at the end of WWI). As I was growing up, my family did teach me and my younger brother some Czech traditions. I also learned two important things about Czechs as a youth: first, kolaches are perhaps the tastiest pastry on planet Earth, and second, Czechs like to drink

On my mother's side of the family we would have huge get togethers. I don't mean just for Thanksgiving or Christmas day family time, I'm referring to weddings, anniversaries, reunions and such. My mother had 41 first cousins along with four sisters. If you count the husbands/wives of these cousins and my aunts and uncles, plus their sons and daughters, you can get into the triple digits for a head count in a very short period of time. We needed some type of gathering hall for these large events. As a high percentage of our relatives lived in the Bertram area, Bertram Township Hall was a convenient place to hold these large parties.

When my brother and I were just boys, mom and dad would drag us along to these sizeable Czech weddings, anniversaries and family reunions. While the adults were enjoying themselves, in part due to the enormous amounts of beer being consumed by them, the activities were not all that exciting for us kids. Sure, my aunts and uncles were present along with my much older cousins, but other than that I had to find something to do. I was a boy and like most boys, I enjoyed throwing rocks. Some of my fondest memories of these events are when they would go into the night time hours. There was a large propane tank outside of Bertram Township Hall and while there were outdoor lights on the hall itself, I don't remember the exterior area of the building being particularly well lit. I and some of the other young boys would back off of the propane tank to the point where you could barely make out its torpedo like silhouette. Then we would heave small rocks with all of our might and see if we could hit our mark. There was a distinct "ping" type sound that would come from that tank when a direct hit was made. It was a satisfying sound for young boy.

At some point in my life, the thrill of throwing rocks at objects diminished and was replaced with other interests. As a young teenager, the list of newly found interests included hunting, fishing, tennis, billiards and slalom (water) skiing, to name a few. Added to this growing list would be girls. During some time in the early summer of 1979 I was with my parents for yet another family event in the Bertram area. I don't recall if it was a wedding or an anniversary party. I do remember a tremendous number of people being there and that we were not at the usual town hall for

this party. Perhaps it was one of the lodges at Palisades-Kepler State Park. In any case, I took a break from watching the adults drink and dance. My Uncle George played the accordion and he was fun to watch, but I was never a fan of polka music and interestingly no one ever taught me how to polka dance. Maybe if I would have liked the music, things might have been different. Rock-n-roll was my thing and none of that music was to be found at this event. I went outside to a pavilion area and I was a little surprised that no one else was outdoors enjoying the nice weather. What happened next was shocking. A girl entered the same outdoor area that I was in and she looked to be around my age. She appeared to be as bored with things as I was. Then something amazing happened. Not only was she very nice looking, she started a conversation with me. Wow! In the beginning I thought this surely was a dream, but no, it was really happening. She introduced herself and she told me her first name was Colleen.

I quickly discovered I had a teenage friend for these adult get-togethers. Over the course of that summer, Colleen became my first girlfriend, at least as close as a boyfriend and girlfriend can get in their mid-teens and given the fact that they lived on opposite sides of a decent sized city. Colleen was the first girl I kissed and I definitely remember that moment with the same importance as when I shot my first rooster pheasant with a 1940's single shot .410 gauge shotgun. Our summer romance ended when we both had to return to school in the fall. I was going to Jefferson High School and she was a student at Mt. Vernon Middle School. Also detrimental

to our relationship was the fact that several adults had told me that Colleen's mother and my mother were cousins, so that made Colleen and myself the dreaded "kissing cousins." My mother neither confirmed nor denied the allegation. Since my mother literally had dozens of cousins, I assumed the adults were telling me the truth. It would be thirty-four years later and the death of my mother until I would learn that I was the subject of an adult prank.

I graduated from Jefferson High School in the spring of 1982 and that fall I was enrolled at Iowa State University. In the fall of 1985 I met my wife to be. She was a freshman and she had just moved into the same campus dormitory as I was living in. I'm uncertain if today our Iowa universities still have coed dormitories, but they certainly did in the 1980's. We were married in August of 1988.

My wife Sheri is an Iowa girl. She grew up in the Quad Cities, on the north and west side of the big river. For grades two through eight her grandmother paid for her education at a private school, St. Katherines in Davenport. While attending school there, she had a best friend. Her name was Jo Myers. Unfortunately, both Sheri and Jo had to part ways at the conclusion of eight grade as they both entered the public school system. Sheri's family moved within the Quad Cities to a house located on Greenwood Ave. I mention this because Greenwood Ave. is one of those divisional streets. Residents on the west side of the avenue were Davenport citizens and if you lived on the east side of this same avenue, you belonged to the community of Bettendorf. Sheri became a Bettendorf Bulldog and Jo went to Davenport Central. As they met new friends in their respective high schools, they slowly lost touch with each other. A total loss of contact continued for over three decades.

2013 was a rough year for me.
My mom passed away at the very beginning of January after a seven year battle with ovarian cancer. My father was still alive, but he had developed early onset Alzheimer's Disease and my mother, brother, and I placed him in an Alzheimer's care center in 2010. When my mom died, the house no longer had any living members of my family. As part of taking care of my mother's estate, I had to empty the house

in order to clean it up and make the property available for sale. In doing so, I discovered many handwritten accounts of her family history as well as hundreds of photographs that I had never seen before. Some of the photos were very old, dating back to the 1800's. In sifting through the family records, I came across a list of all of her cousins, their spouses and their children. I still remembered Colleen's last name, so I searched for Corcoran on the family genealogy records. That last name was not there. It seemed as though the old timers had played a practical joke on me. The Corcorans lived a mile east of Bertram, but they were not actually related to me. Because Colleen's mom & dad knew so many of my relatives, they would get invited to the big events. They were usually at the celebrations, drinking keg beer and partying along with my Czech family members.

With my mom passing away and with my discovery of all those records and photos she had kept, I had a great family history to construct. I became the keeper of our family records on both sides of the family. I started to do some genealogy work and I developed a fascination with my roots and the ancestors that came before me. One of my mother's first cousins that I remembered seeing on the old records was Irma Lnenicka. Her maiden name was the same as my mother's maiden name. Irma was one of her "double cousins", a term I didn't fully understand until I started doing genealogy research. Irma's mother and my mom's mother were sisters. Irma's father and my mother's father were brothers. This is where the double part comes into play: two sisters married two brothers. Their sons and daughters are therefore double cousins, since genetically the cousins have a double shot of genetics. Normally, you only have one aunt or uncle that is your blood relative in a particular marriage. In this situation, both your aunt and uncle are related to

you by blood. In 1948 Irma Lnenicka married a man named Stanley Drahos and her name became Irma Drahos. Going back to my youth, I remember Irma and Stanley and being at massive bonfires with them at Sandy Beach and Sugar Bottom on the shores of Coralville Reservoir.

Sometime around the passing of my mother, a happen chance occurrence took place in the Quad Cities. My wife's father Ken was at a funeral and recognized one of the other attendants. She happened to be an old friend of the family. That friend was Jo, the schoolmate and childhood best friend of my wife. Ken and Jo had a nice conversation and ultimately exchanged contact information. Part of that information included e-mail addresses and Ken forwarded Jo's address to my wife. After thirty some years, the two best friends were in contact with each other and catching up on what had happened in their lives during the last three decades. It turns out that Jo is living in Colorado, she is recently divorced from her husband Dan, she has a son and daughter that are both attending Iowa State University and that she comes to lowa several times a year to visit with her adult children. On her very next visit to lowa, Jo scheduled some time to come to our farm and go on a tour of our place. I meet her for the first time and the three of us get along great. Jo loves the outdoors and enjoys hiking the Rocky Mountains. Really, she doesn't just hike the mountains, she jogs and bikes the mountain trails at extreme elevations. Jo tells us about all of the "fourteeners" in her area of Colorado. Those are the mountains that have peaks over 14,000 feet and the summits can be hiked, sometimes in a single day if you can start the trail above tree line. This is great news to hear for Sheri and myself, as we annually go to the different western states and hike various sections of the Rocky Mountain range. Usually Sheri and I'do hikes within one of our national parks. Jo invited us out to join her on a hike the next year, which we did in the area where she lives, near Poncha Springs, Colorado.

During one of our conversations with Jo, we were joking about my Bohemian ancestry and those huge family events I was part of in the little town of Bertram. To my amazement, Jo not only knew where Bertram was located in Iowa, she had been to numerous family weddings/reunions with her husband Dan at



Bertram Township Hall.

Of all the people in the United States of America, my wife's best friend Jo Myers marries an Iowa boy named Dan Drahos. Dan Drahos and Stanley Drahos are related to each other as Stanley and Dan's grandfather Albin were cousins. Both Drahos families lived in the Bertram area. Dan was most likely at some of the Czech events of our youth at Bertram Hall, but I don't distinctly remember him. Heck, we may have been hanging out together and throwing rocks at that propane tank.

In review, from my perspective I obviously know my wife Sheri, Colleen Corcoran and Jo Myers. I should remember Dan Drahos but I can't recall him. Sheri knows everyone with the exception of Colleen; she is even friends with Dan on Facebook and they do communicate with each other on a personal level (with Jo's blessing!). Jo may actually know everyone represented here if she attended one of Dan's class reunions and Colleen was present. The same would apply to Colleen, except she would not know my wife Sheri. Finally, Dan knows Jo and Colleen personally, and Sheri and I tangentially through Facebook and e-mail communications.

This is my small world story. It doesn't circle the globe or involve Hollywood celebrities or professional athletes. But it does contain five lowans that are connected through friendships and marriages and who grew up in different towns and cities in our state. Perhaps the most interesting thing in my story is that two of the characters, Dan Drahos and Colleen Corcoran, not only know each other as they both went to Mt. Vernon High School, they are in the same class year and their senior photos are on back to back pages of the 1984 Mustang yearbook. Yet neither one of them completely knows the links to and between the other four people in this small world. Out of the five of us, I am the only one that has the knowledge to close the spoked wheel of personal connections.

To finish my story, I'm sure that you, being an observant reader, are probably wondering if Colleen and I still stay in touch with each other. Amazingly, I haven't seen or spoke with my friend and fellow teenage rebel Colleen for almost forty years. Our paths never crossed again. I don't remember being at any family events in Bertram the following summer and by the time I became a junior at Jefferson High School I had a steady girlfriend from my same class year. Then I went on to ISU and met another universe of new people, both guys and gals. During college summers I worked for what was then the Iowa Conservation Commission (now the Iowa DNR) and I did not make it back home for those huge family parties in the town of Bertram. I never got to tell Colleen about the older folks claim that we were kissing cousins, or that many years later I would discover that the rumor was just a practical joke played on me. I guess what is important is that I still have all of the fun memories of our summer together in 1979. And of all the things that matter to me in life, this is one that still puts a smile on my

A Side Note from Jim: "I thought you would find this interesting.....

Harold Suchomel was the Mt. Vernon School District Maintenance Supervisor until 1990. Harold was a first cousin to my mother. He passed away in 2015 and today he only has one living sibling, his brother Glenn Suchomel. Even though he is a generation older than me, Glenn and I get along great and we love to share old time stories with each other. I vaguely remember Harold at some of the family reunions when I was younger.

Albert Lnenicka is a 1956 graduate of Mt. Vernon High School. He is one of my mother's "double cousins". His sister was Irma Lnenicka Drahos from my short story. Albert and his wife Shirley are both relatives and friends of mine. I also know their daughter Lisa Lnenicka ('87) Steven. Lisa has a sister, Julie Lnenicka ('88) Farris.

George Petrick ('35) married Joanne Lnenicka. Joanne is also a double cousin to my mother, so she is one of Albert Lnenicka's sisters. George and Joanne have two sons and two daughters, Larry ('62), John ('64), Diana Petrick ('68) Price and Kathryn Petrick ('78) Crowley. They would be second cousins to me."



On my first day of teaching at MVHS, a freshman student came to my door, introduced himself, shook my hand and let me know what class he was in. I will always remember this young man. He reinforced why I was teaching in Mount Vernon. Mount Vernon is truly a special place to be a student and a teacher. It has been a joy to complete my teaching career here. I saved the best for last.

Another teacher or staff member who was a mentor or helped you in your career and what did they do that was helpful to you?

I worked with Gary and Ava Stamp my first two years of teaching at Olin, IA. Gary was the AD and faculty member down the hall from me. Gary not only was in my car pool, but was a great mentor to me these first years. I often wonder if I would have taught for 30 years if were not for Gary. How was I to know that Gary later in life would be my daughter's softball coach at MVHS? Gary not only had a profound outcome on my life, but also made a lasting impact on my daughter.

Favorite memories: When I applied for the job at Mount Vernon it turned into a family affair. I had not written a new resume for 16 years. They look a bit different these days. My son sat beside me and helped me rework and reformat. The online application was a bit daunting. My daughter helped me navigate this not once, but twice following an email from Mr. Brand that they had changed to the Grant Wood AEÁ format and could I please do this again. It shouldn't take long the email stated. 4 ½ hours later (both times) I was set to go. Moral of the story for both myself and for my children: It is never too late to change your life, even if you are a teacher and over 50.

The best compliment I received from a student in all 30 years of teaching was from a young lady my first year a MVHS. I overheard her tell another student during a lab activity, "Mrs. Henik always looks like she loves what she does". I think that sums it up. I have

loved this journey.

What has changed in education?

Technology has changed the way that both students and teachers access information. It has also changed the way we communicate, in both positive and negative ways. Communication is fast and easy, but not as personal. I sort of miss the personal. I think that I why most of us become teachers. We like building relationships.
